Dear supporter friends,

As I write this letter amidst the freedom and economic blessings most of us experience in the USA, I am keenly aware of the missiles and bombs dropping on the people of Ukraine at this very moment. Our dedicated Ukrainian national workers, with the help and direction of our evacuated American staff, are courageously doing what they can to try to help people suffering the ravages of war.

I am reminded of the scripture in Matthew 24:6-8: “And ye shall hear of wars and rumours of wars: see that ye be not troubled: for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrows.”

In addition to the thousands of people killed and the millions fleeing the Ukraine/Russia conflict, we are also aware of the ongoing conflicts and mass displacements of people in Yemen, Myanmar, Syria, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, and other countries. Not since World War II has the world seen so many refugees and internally displaced people.

In addition to the wars and uprisings mentioned in Matthew 24, it also references famines (hundreds of millions around the world are facing a hunger crisis), pestilences (COVID-19 has claimed the lives of an estimated six million), and earthquakes (two in Haiti in 2021 killed several thousand people and destroyed hundreds of homes). In the face of news like this, it is very important that we do as Jesus encouraged us in verse 6: “. . . see that ye be not troubled.” God is, after all, in control of our lives, and as children of His we can find peace and rest both now and eternally. Praise the Lord!

THANK YOU VERY MUCH for your faithful prayers, contributions, and volunteer work in 2021!

Together, we are privileged to show forth the love of Christ and make a difference in the lives of millions of people who find themselves in difficult circumstances.

Your generosity blesses untold numbers of the widowed, orphaned, elderly, sick, and handicapped, as well as poor families and schoolchildren, in many parts of the world. Storm victims in the USA are blessed and encouraged through interaction with volunteer workers. Many impoverished people learn how to become self-sustainable. Your support enables us to provide Bibles for large numbers of believers who eagerly seek a copy of the holy Scriptures. Purpose Statement

Christian Aid Ministries was founded in 1981 as a nonprofit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization. Our main purpose is to glorify God and help enlarge His kingdom: “. . . whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God” (I Corinthians 10:31).

CAM strives to be a trustworthy and efficient channel for Amish, Mennonite, and other conservative Anabaptist groups and individuals to minister to physical and spiritual needs around the world. This is in response to the command, “. . . do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith” (Galatians 6:10). Our goal is to connect people who want to help with people who need help.

CAM’s main goals in providing aid are:

To help and encourage God’s people

To help bring the Gospel to a lost and dying world

What we do

Generous supporters and volunteers make it possible to:

Distribute food, clothing, medicines, and seeds to orphans, widows, the elderly, and impoverished Christian families.

Reach out to people in material poverty and help them provide for themselves through self-help resources, microloans, savings groups, agricultural programs, and Christ-centered teaching.

Print and distribute Bibles, Bible story books, and other Christian literature to believers and unbelievers across the globe.

Clean up and rebuild for survivors of natural disasters in the USA.

Help victims of war, famine, and natural disasters in various countries.

Provide alternative places of employment for conscientious objectors to serve should the USA activate a military draft.

Install Gospel billboards along America’s major highways.

Support church planting efforts in Romania, Haiti, and Liberia.

Operate medical clinics in Haiti and Nicaragua.

Statement of Faith and Practice

GOD

- 1. We believe in one God, eternally existing as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. (Matthew 28:19; Galatians 4:4-6; Ephesians 2:6, 13-18; I John 5:1-13)
- 2. We believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and that He was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. (Luke 1:35; Matthew 1:20-25)
- 3. We believe that the Holy Spirit convicts of sin, effects the New Birth, gives guidance in life, empowers for service, and enables perseverance in faith and holiness. (John 16:7-11, 13)

CREATION AND HUMAN LIFE

- 4. We believe that in the beginning, God created all things in six 24-hour days and rested on the seventh day. We believe that God made man in His own image, with a free will, a moral character, and a spiritual nature. (Genesis 1:26-27; Colossians 1:16, 17; John 1:1-13)
- 5. We believe that human life is sacred and begins at conception. God forms a human being in the womb as either a genetic male or a genetic female. We believe that God disapproves of and forbids any attempt to alter one’s gender. A Christian must not take part in any destruction of human life, born or unborn; therefore, we cannot endorse or allow abortive contraceptives. (Isaiah 44:24; Psalm 139:15; Jeremiah 1:5; Luke 1:44; Luke 18:20; Romans 1:26-29, Matthew 19:4)

SCRIPTURE

- 6. We believe that the Bible is the divinely inspired Word of God, revealing God and His will, both in the Old and New Testaments. (Luke 1:70; II Timothy 3:16; II Peter 1:20, 21)

SIN AND SALVATION

- 7. We believe that man, through unbelief and disobedience, fell into sin bringing depravity and death upon the human race; that man as a sinner is self-centered and self-willed, unable to redeem himself. (Romans 3:10-18, 23, 5:12)
- 8. We believe that there is one Mediator between God and man, the Man Christ Jesus, who shed His blood and died on Calvary to redeem us from sin, was resurrected from the dead, ascended to heaven, and is sitting at the right hand of the Father interceding for us. (John 3:16; Hebrews 9:12-14, 10:12; Colossians 1:20-22)
- 9. We believe that salvation is by grace through faith in Christ—a free gift bestowed by God on all who believe in Christ, repent of their sins, are born again, and walk in newness of life. (Ephesians 2:8, 9; John 3:3, 5; Romans 6:1-7, 10:9,10)
- 10. We believe that those who repent and believe should be baptized with water as a symbol of: new birth, baptism of the Spirit, cleansing from sin, commitment to Christ, and separation from evil. (Matthew 28:19; Acts 2:38, 10:44-48; I Peter 3:21)

THE CHURCH

- 11. We believe that the church is the body of Christ, and that all those who are born again and walk in obedience to the Word of God, constitute the true church of which Christ is the Head. (Ephesians 1:22, 23; Colossians 1:18; I John 1:7; I Timothy 3:15)
- 12. We believe that God provides the church with the necessary leadership such as bishops, ministers, evangelists, and deacons, to shepherd the flock, teach the Word, administer the ordinances, and lead the church in the exercise of discipline. (Ephesians 4:11-16)
- 13. We believe that Christ commissioned the church to: evangelize the world, make disciples of all men and teach them to follow Him in a Biblical walk of life, and to minister to the

needs of all people. (Mark 16:15; Matthew 28:19, 20; I John 3:17)

- 14. We believe that the church and state are ordained of God as separate entities in His divine plan, and that believers should honor rulers and be subject to their authority and pray for them. (Romans 13:1-7; I Peter 2:13-17)
- 15. We believe that the unrepentant, fallen brother or sister shall be excommunicated from the body of Christ in the spirit of love, and shall be received back into fellowship upon repentance and amendment of life. (I Corinthians 5:1-13; II Corinthians 6:14)
- 16. We believe that the church should observe the communion of the Lord’s Supper as a symbol of His broken body and shed blood, in a common union of believers with Christ and one another. (I Corinthians 10:16-21, 11:23-26)
- 17. We believe that Christ taught both by example and by commandment that feet-washing is a symbol of brotherhood, service, and humility, and should be observed literally. (John 13:3-17)
- 18. We believe that the holy kiss should be practiced as a symbol of Christian love among the believers, brother with brother, and sister with sister. (Romans 16:16; I Peter 5:14)

MARRIAGE

- 19. We believe that marriage is designed by God to be the union of one naturally-born man and one naturally-born woman for life. Therefore, any sexual relationship outside this marriage is sin. Furthermore, adultery, fornication, homosexuality, pornography, lesbianism, and any other sexual involvement is condemned by God. (Hebrews 13:4; Mark 10:6-9; Romans 1:24-28; Matthew 5:27-28; I Corinthians 6:9, 10)

CHRISTIAN LIVING

- 20. We believe that God has established unique roles of authority for man and woman. Therefore, a man’s head is to be uncovered in praying and prophesying, and the woman’s head is to be veiled, and her hair uncut, signifying their acceptance of God’s order. (I Corinthians 11:1-16)
- 21. We believe that anointing with oil, accompanied by the prayer of faith, is honored by God in the restoration of physical health, in accordance to His will. (James 5:14, 15)
- 22. We believe that the personal appearance and lifestyle of Christian men and women should be modest, free from worldly fashion and adornment, maintaining simplicity in all areas of life, living as strangers and pilgrims in this world, seeking a city not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. (Romans 12:1, 2; James 4:4; I John 2:15-17)
- 23. We believe that all human beings bear the image of their Creator, God, and must be treated with dignity and respect, showing the love of Jesus in a way that draws all men to God. (Galatians 5:14; I John 4:7)
- 24. We believe that Christians should live a nonresistant lifestyle, without any acts of retaliation, demonstrating the love of Christ in our daily walk. (Matthew 5:39-46; John 18:36; Romans 12:19-21)

ETERNITY

- 25. We believe in the second coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, the blessed hope of believers, and that upon His return He will resurrect the righteous to eternal bliss in heaven, and the unrighteous to eternal damnation in hell. He will sit on the throne of His glory, judging all nations in the last day. (I Thessalonians 4:16, 17; Matthew 25:31-46)

Haiti Kidnapping

A huge thank you to the many Christians around the world who prayed for us during the difficult two months when our workers were held hostage in Haiti. Following are excerpts from updates we gave throughout the time we waited for their deliverance.

October 17, 2021: We request urgent prayer for the group of Christian Aid Ministries workers who were abducted while on a trip to visit an orphanage on Saturday, October 16. We are seeking God’s direction for a resolution, and authorities are seeking ways to help.

The group of sixteen U.S. citizens and one Canadian citizen includes six men, six women, and five children. Join us in praying for those who are being held hostage, the kidnappers, and the families, friends, and churches of those affected. Pray for those who are seeking God’s direction and making decisions regarding this matter.

October 21, 2021: Letter from families of the hostages:
Dear church of Christ around the world,
Thank you for your prayers on behalf of our family members who are being held hostage in Haiti. God has given our loved ones the unique opportunity to live out our Lord’s command to “love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you” (Matthew 5:44).

God invites us to call upon His name in the day of trouble (Psalm 50:15). We thank Him that He is God, and ask Him to hear our prayers and bring our families home. We also pray that the light of God’s love might shine out into the darkness of sin, and that the gang members might be freed from their bondage to sin and experience freedom in Jesus Christ.

Thank you, brothers and sisters in Christ, and PLEASE keep praying!
October 23, 2021: Today marks one week since our workers and loved ones were kidnapped in Haiti. This group is still being held hostage. It has been a week of many tears and thousands—if not millions—of prayers.

November 10, 2021: *God created you for ministry. If you are not serving, you are just existing. God wants to use you to make a difference in this world.* This saying is posted on the desk of one of our workers who is being held hostage in Haiti. This person, along with the others who were kidnapped, had a heartfelt desire to serve the people of Haiti.

November 12, 2021: It is now the twenty-eighth day since the kidnapping in Haiti took place... Admittedly, the waiting is difficult.

November 16, 2021: Throughout the past month... we have

received hundreds and hundreds of encouraging letters from caring people in forty-five states and fifty-five countries.

November 21, 2021: We have learned that two of the hostages in Haiti were released. We praise God for this!... The two hostages who were released are safe, in good spirits, and being cared for.

November 24, 2021: Thanksgiving Day is tomorrow... Families get together on this special day to thank God for His blessings during the past year and enjoy good food and fellowship. Overshadowing all of this is the fact that fifteen of our loved ones are still held hostage in Haiti.

November 30, 2021: We are aware that numerous kidnappings—mostly of Haitian people—continue to take place in Haiti... We recognize that other families are anxiously awaiting the return of their loved ones.

December 3, 2021: Next week, on Monday through Wednesday,

we invite believers around the world to observe focused prayer and fasting for the release of the hostages.

December 6, 2021: We are thankful to God that three more hostages were released last night. Those who were released are safe and seem to be in good spirits.

December 9, 2021: A nine-year-old boy wrote the following note: “I want to encourage you and make sure you know that God is with you... Joshua 1:9 says, ‘Be strong and courageous, do not be afraid or discouraged because of them. For the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go.’”

December 16, 2021: **We glorify God for answered prayer—the remaining twelve hostages are FREE!** Join us in praising God that all seventeen of our loved ones are now safe. Thank you for your fervent prayers throughout the past two months... “I will sing unto the Lord, for he hath triumphed gloriously” (Exodus 15:1b).

Other things new or significant in 2021

COVID ravages India: In early 2021, a second wave of COVID-19 hit India, killing many people and bringing lockdowns that decimated the economy. The working poor suffered tremendously as hunger became a pressing issue.

Haiti's president assassinated: Jovenel Moïse was assassinated in July, and his wife, First Lady Martine Moïse, was critically injured. This further deteriorated Haiti's political stability.

Taliban takeover in Afghanistan: In August, the government of Afghanistan fell, and the feared Taliban, a Muslim extremist group, took control. CAM continues to work through contacts to assist some of the many people suffering from this crisis in Afghanistan.

Violent tornadoes in Kentucky: In December, severe tornadoes moved across western Kentucky. One unusually long-track tornado brought catastrophic damage to numerous areas. Rapid Response Services provided cleanup in various parts of the state.

Widows Care Fund launched: CAM introduced the Widows Care Fund to help provide food, self-help resources, and other assistance for needy widows in India and other places.

CAM supporters helped supply approximately 54.4 million pounds of food, medicines, clothing, comforters, seeds, Bibles, Christian literature, heating supplies, and other aid. This is equal to about 1,297 semi loads of aid.

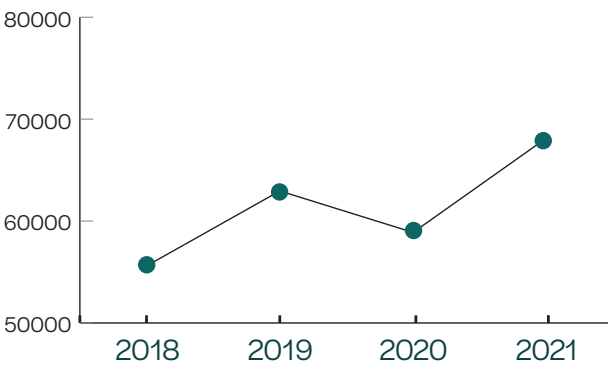

Water-for-the-World

Throughout 2021, CAM gave significant focus to providing clean water sources in poverty-stricken countries.

The danger of polluted water or the constant struggle of searching for clean water is unfathomable to most of us. In impoverished countries, women and young children are forced to trek miles in search for this life-sustaining liquid. Their water source might be a river, mud puddle, or some other stagnant waterhole. Murky water

can contain dangerous bacteria which cause diarrhea, cholera, and other diseases with potentially fatal consequences.

Your support helped bring pure water sources to many communities. In 2021, the Water-for-the-World program provided 354 wells in Asia, Ethiopia, Malawi, Gaza, Zimbabwe, and other places. Now these people have the necessity they desperately needed, the gift of fresh water.

Coronavirus Crisis Care

2021 brought a grim turn of events in many areas of the world, especially India and other parts of Asia. For some, loss of loved ones was reality. For others, spiking food prices, strict lockdowns, and lack of work pushed the poor into hopelessness and starvation in some cases. We immensely appreciate how you as supporters rose to the occasion, enabling us to respond to pleas for help. **This relief effort is the largest CAM has ever done.** One contact wrote, “Your prayers and generous support have changed the lives of many people who were in utter distress and unbearable pain.”

As food and other aid was distributed, our ultimate goal was to point people to Jesus. Our contacts report that many people repented and came to the Lord as a result of the compassion of Christians who helped them in their distress.

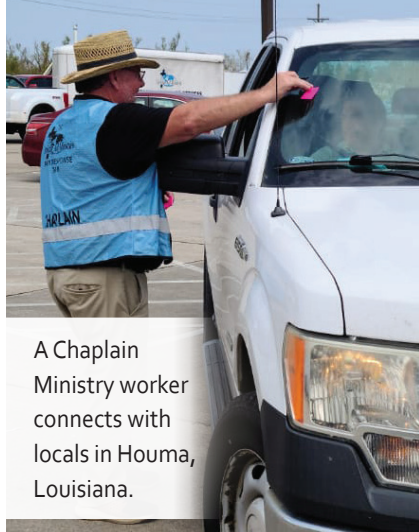

Disaster Response Services USA

The Disaster Response Services programs provide a way to reach out to our “neighbors” in the United States. Our goal is to be the hands and feet of Jesus in times of distress and loss. Here is an overview of our 2021 activities.

DRS Rebuilding: CAM set up rebuilding bases in Beaumont, Texas; Chattanooga, Tennessee; Moss Bluff, Louisiana; Westlake, Louisiana; Barceloneta, Puerto Rico; and Gates, Oregon. Coming from various states and provinces, 1,349 volunteers joined their skills to rebuild and restore 179 damaged and destroyed homes.

Rapid Response Services: In 2021, Rapid Response Services helped clean up after ice storms, windstorms, tornadoes, and floods. More than 1,100 people were blessed by 2,635 volunteers who left

their homes to help in disaster-stricken areas.

Loaves and Fishes Food Kitchen: CAM’s Loaves & Fishes Food Kitchen is operated by the New Order Amish and provides hot meals to people in disaster areas. In 2021, Loaves & Fishes volunteers spent 12,436 hours to serve 34,863 meals in the wake of Hurricane Ida in Louisiana.

Chaplain Ministry Program: Natural disasters like tornadoes, hurricanes, and floods often leave people traumatized and in need of Christ-centered support. During 2021, Chaplain Ministry workers traveled to various states to give support and guide survivors to Jesus, our true rest and hope.

Search & Rescue

The mission of CAM’s Search & Rescue program is to reunite missing individuals with their loved ones. Helping to search for lost and missing persons gives us an opportunity to reach out with Christ’s love and touch the lives of people right here in our homeland.

Our trained Search & Rescue teams include volunteers from Anabaptist communities in Arkansas, Illinois, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Virginia.

In 2021:
Search & Rescue teams responded to
98 incidents.

These incidents included drowning victims, missing children, dementia patients, and others.

Conservative Anabaptist Service Program (CASP)

CASP’s foremost goal is to provide alternative places of employment approved by the United States Selective Service System (SSS) where conscientious objectors can serve their required time, should the U.S. government activate a draft.

Twenty church constituencies are signed up under the CASP

program. CASP coordinates with these groups on pilot projects where service-age men work as if a draft was in place. Projects last at least four weeks per group and usually include forestry work or rebuilding homes in disaster areas.

In 2021:

13 pilot projects **137** alternative service workers

Billboard Evangelism

Each day CAM’s Gospel billboards prompt millions to consider their spiritual condition. What a privilege it is to minister to troubled souls and point them to God! Our phone team addresses a generation alarmingly unattached to the Bible. Many Americans are fearful, confused, or close to despair.

More than 1,500 Gospel billboards are posted throughout the United States. We pray that God would use the simple messages “to open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins . . .” Acts 26:19

In 2021:

27.3 million people saw a CAM Gospel billboard every day. (2021 estimate)

108,832 calls were logged. Some callers listened to recorded messages, and others chose to speak to a phone team member.

12,955 callers chose to listen to a brief sermon on our phone menu.

1,016 packets were mailed to interested callers.

International Crisis 2021 projects

\$1,000,000 - \$3,500,000 projects

Afghanistan Crisis: Afghanistan’s government fell in August 2021. The Taliban, a Muslim extremist group, took control. Many people fled the country, while others are stranded inside Afghanistan and face hunger and other difficulties. CAM worked through contacts to provide food, emergency supplies, and other aid to needy Afghans.

War in Yemen: The war in Yemen started in 2014 and has now passed the eight-year mark. The conflict continues with ceasefires never holding for more than a short time. Millions of Yemenis experience desperate needs and severe hunger. CAM supplied food, water systems, comforters, hygiene kits, and other aid.

Middle East Refugee Crisis: Although active fighting largely subsided in Syria, the aftermath is far from over. We provided food, hygiene items, blankets, Christian literature, medical care, heating assistance, schooling for refugee children, and other aid for people affected by the wars in Syria and Iraq.

\$250,000 - \$1,000,000 projects

Venezuela Economic Crisis: The economic crisis in Venezuela left multitudes in great need. We worked through conservative Anabaptist contacts to provide food and Christian literature in Venezuela and surrounding countries like Peru and Colombia.

Bangladesh Rohingya Refugee Crisis: In 2017, the Rohingya people fled to Bangladesh because of violence in Myanmar. This created the world’s largest refugee camp. In 2021, supporters’ funds made quality medical care available for Rohingya refugees. In addition, the SALT Agri-Plus program helped refugees develop and improve garden plots to grow food for themselves.

Haiti Political Crisis: To respond to the ongoing political and economic crisis, CAM operated Work-for-Wages projects such as repairing roads and developing water systems. These projects enabled needy Haitians to earn an income while doing projects to benefit their communities.

Israel/Gaza Conflict: For eleven days in May 2021, militants in Gaza, the strip of land between Israel and Egypt, launched thousands of rockets into Israel. The Israeli military retaliated by carrying out hundreds of airstrikes in the Gaza Strip. In the aftermath, CAM provided food and other aid.

Lebanon Economic Crisis: Throughout 2021, the economic situation in Lebanon continued to degenerate as the value of currency plummeted. CAM provided food and hygiene items.

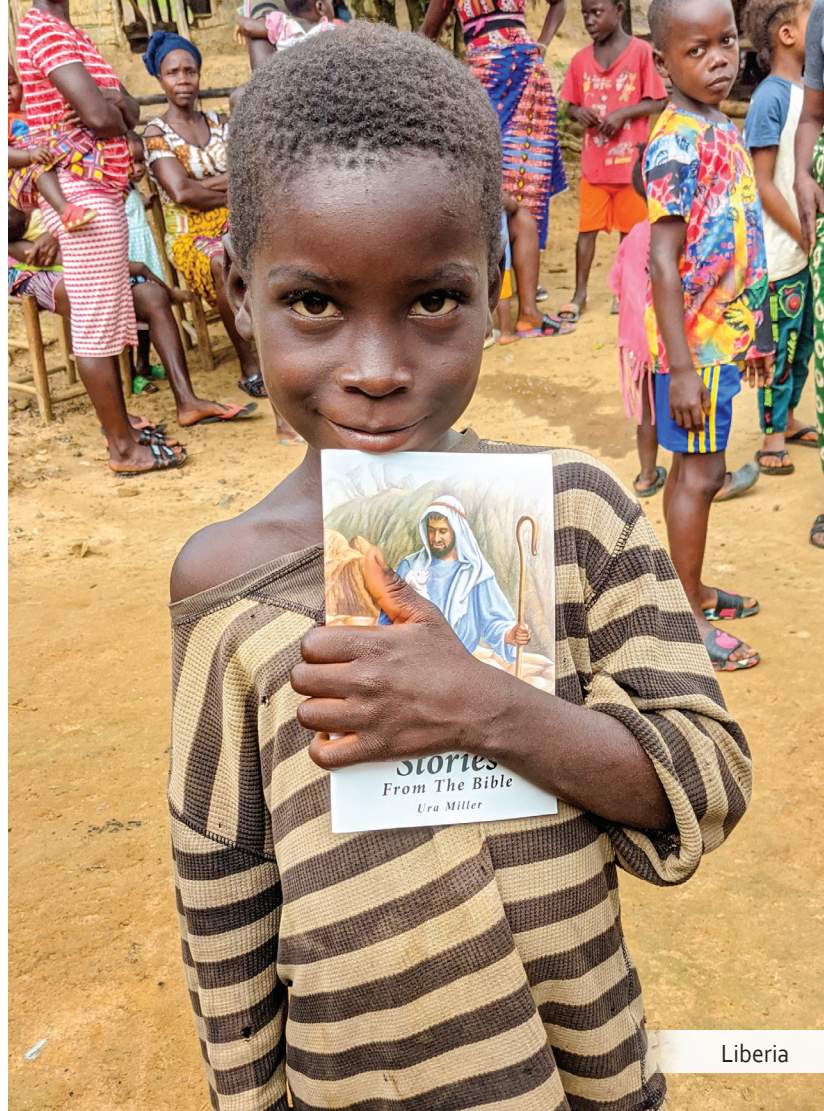

Christian Family Magazines

The Christian Family Magazines program distributes more than 1 million Bible-based magazines every month. These magazines fill a large need where Bible teaching is needed and Christian literature is rare. Most Christian family magazines are distributed to believers in closed and restricted countries who have little to no practical Bible-teaching literature.

13.9 million Christian family magazines provided in 2021.

Highlights of 2021

Nigeria: There are now more than 5,000 SALT members in Nigeria. Many group members testify of changed lives as the lessons from the SALT manuals challenge many areas of their lives.

Ghana: Twenty-three groups of SALT Agri-Plus farmers in Ghana stored 1,097 bushels of grain in grain bins made by local craftsmen. They will withdraw this saved grain at the end of the dry season when their other food stock is depleted.

Haiti: The political crisis in Haiti made it challenging for American SALT staff to continue living in the country. By the end of 2021, many of the staff members returned home. National SALT staff members continue operations in Haiti with American directors administering remotely.

Bangladesh: COVID-19 related government lockdowns in April and again in July caused difficulty for SALT members to meet for their weekly savings and teaching meetings. Thankfully, by September restrictions were lifted and meetings normalized again. Despite the difficulties, over 1,000 members were added to the program throughout the year.

Grenada: The SALT program is in the process of starting in the country of Grenada. As usual, when starting in a new country, it can be challenging to get individuals interested in forming savings groups.

CAM programs

Descriptions and updates

Adopt-A-Family Communism collapsed in Eastern Europe more than 30 years ago, but its effects are still seen today. The cost of living continues to rise in spite of low incomes, and families wonder how they will survive. For the poorest families in Romania, Moldova, and Ukraine, food parcels bring a ray of hope. Adopt-A-Family parcels are mostly for struggling Christian families, but some parcels are distributed to unbelievers as a means of outreach. This program also helps support needy recipients in the Middle East and families in Nicaragua, the second poorest country in the western hemisphere. Each sponsorship of \$75 a month sends a 50-pound parcel of food and healthcare items to those in need.

Adult Disposable Briefs Adult disposable briefs are a critical need almost everywhere in the world CAM works. Briefs are distributed to people who care for the elderly, paralyzed, or handicapped. Adult briefs are vital in easing the burden of caretakers who have limited resources and often live without running water or indoor plumbing.

All-Nations Bible Translation Thousands of tribal groups go through life without a copy of the Bible in their own language. CAM supports All-Nations Bible Translation, an Anabaptist-based organization that coordinates Bible translation to fill this need. Funds are used to train and support translators, produce quality Bible translations, coordinate community development projects, and help plant churches that apply these Scriptures.

Biblical Discipleship Centers Pastors, teachers, and other men receive teaching at CAM's Biblical Discipleship Centers in Haiti, Liberia, and Nicaragua. Three-week seminars cover topics like spiritual warfare, family life, and leadership. The goal of these seminars is to promote sound doctrine to attendees so they can influence their churches in a Biblical way.

Bibles-for-the-World At the heart of CAM programs is the goal to get God's Word into as many hands as possible. In 2021, donations to this program helped provide 4.5 million Bibles. To spread the words of truth, we also use the avenues of Bible story books, inspirational books, and Bible correspondence courses. God has opened the door to distribute some of these items in unique places of the world, including closed and restricted countries.

Billboard Evangelism Many Americans call themselves Christians but do not follow Biblical principles. Others refuse to acknowledge that God exists. To remind people of God and His truth, CAM has posted more than 1,500 Gospel messages across the United States. Most of these messages are posted on billboards along interstates and major highways. Thousands of people call our toll-free number, searching for answers about God, the Bible, and life issues. More than 108,000 calls were logged in 2021. Of

these callers, some chose to listen to recorded messages, and others chose to speak to a phone team member.

Blankets for the Poor Millions of people in the world's poorest countries are ill prepared when winter hits. Many of them lack money for food so buying blankets is out of the question. People often suffer from the cold, and some even freeze to death. Although we ship thousands of donated comforters around the world, we are unable to ship comforters into many countries. In these countries, we provide funds to purchase blankets in the country to distribute to the needy. On average, the delivered price of a good, warm blanket bought directly from factories is about \$25.

Christian Family Magazines Biblical teaching material is in great demand in many parts of the world. CAM responds to this need through the *Seed of Truth* and *Antorcha de la Verdad* (Torch of Truth) magazines. Both magazines are written by conservative Anabaptists and include articles and stories for children, youth, and adults. They are printed in 10 languages and distributed in approximately 100 countries and territories. In 2021, supporters provided 12 million *Seed of Truth* and related magazines and 1.8 million *Antorcha de la Verdad* magazines.

Christian-Martyrs-Fund Over the years, pastors and other Christian workers in Vietnam, the former Soviet Union, and the Middle East faced tremendous persecution. As a result, some suffer physical and mental disabilities that make it difficult to earn a living. The Christian-Martyrs-Fund supports such pastors and Christian workers with money for food, clothing, medical needs, and other necessities. In some cases, this program sponsors the widows and children of people who were martyred for their faith. The program also provides special assistance to believers facing or fleeing persecution.

Christian Schooling for Eastern Europe The Romanian public school environment is becoming increasingly hostile to Christian values. Immorality and secularism are fast making inroads and

leaving negative effects. Many Christians are desperate for an alternative but don't know where to turn or how to get started. The vision for this program is to provide a Christ-centered solution to the schooling needs of Christian families in Romania and several surrounding countries. The program provides teacher training and supports workers who visit and encourage families. More than 940 students are enrolled.

Church Planting Projects When CAM establishes a base in a country, we feel the need to have a church nearby that shares our beliefs. These churches benefit our field staff and open spiritual opportunities in the community. CAM financially supports church-planting efforts in Haiti, Romania, and Liberia. Among the five supported churches are 193 members. Funds are used to provide meeting places and cover the costs of ministry trips and other needs.

Clothing Bundle Project This program ships large amounts of quality used clothing to many parts of the world. Supporters also provide footwear, fabric, and thousands of comforters. The items are sorted by volunteers and staff at our clothing centers in various states. Although the items are donated, there are costs involved in getting the items to their destination. Every gift of \$69 processes, ships, and distributes approximately 125 pounds of clothing, footwear, and comforters. In some cases, funds are used to purchase clothing, shoes, and blankets to meet specific needs.

Comforter Project CAM receives thousands of cozy, handmade comforters from sewing groups and individuals each year. These comforters are in high demand around the world and help bring warmth and cheer to those in need. Funds from supporters help ship them to their final destinations. Comforters are distributed to families in Eastern Europe, refugees in the Middle East, and others in various locations. Comforters are also a blessing in tropical countries where recipients sometimes use them as beds or blankets during damp and rainy weather.

Conservative Anabaptist Service Program This program operates under CAM and provides alternative places of employment for conscientious objectors to serve, should the U.S. government activate a military draft. CASP has pilot projects in place where draft-age men work just as if there would be a draft. In 2021, 137 volunteers served on 13 rebuilding and forestry projects. The goal of CASP is to provide ethical and moral work environments for alternative service workers.

Coronavirus Crisis Care The economic fallout of COVID-19 resulted in enormous suffering, especially in countries that already faced great needs. These areas will likely suffer for years to come as economies recover. This program enables CAM to respond to requests for help with food, hygiene items, medical supplies, and other aid. The uncertainties caused many people who had no interest in God to receive the Gospel. This opened a door to provide Bibles, Christian literature, and other avenues of spiritual encouragement.

Disaster Response Services USA Our Disaster Response Services (DRS) programs provide relief in the wake of disasters in the United States. These projects open opportunities for our staff and volunteers to build relationships and minister the love and comfort of Jesus in a time of loss. Disaster Response Services ministers through the following avenues:

DRS Rebuilding: If long-term recovery help is needed in a disaster area, our DRS Rebuilding program sets up a base. We then schedule volunteer work teams to rebuild or repair homes in the area. Recipients are generally underinsured and have a low income. Many of them have nowhere else to turn for help. DRS Rebuilding projects can last anywhere from several months to several years.

Rapid Response Services: When a tornado, hurricane, flood, or wildfire strikes, our 24 Rapid Response teams scattered across the U.S. are equipped and ready to investigate and respond to the damage. Our goal is to have a Rapid Response team research a disaster within 24 hours and respond with volunteers within 48 hours. Cleanup projects include cutting up fallen trees, clearing debris, mucking out flooded houses, putting tarps on damaged roofs, and more.

Loaves & Fishes Food Kitchen: When the power is off or someone's home is damaged or destroyed, receiving a hot meal means a lot. The Loaves & Fishes Food Kitchen, operated by the New Order Amish churches, sets up in disaster areas of the U.S. Loaves & Fishes ministers to people by serving delicious meals, lending a listening ear, praying with suffering people, and distributing Christian literature.

Chaplain Ministry Program: This program sends out qualified and trained personnel to work alongside CAM's Rapid Response and Loaves & Fishes teams. Many people don't have a network of friends or church family to support them and are

desperate for a listening ear and someone to provide encouragement and spiritual direction.

Egypt-Sponsor-A-Child A large number of Coptic Christians in the Nile River Valley live in deplorable conditions, marginalized from society. In some areas of Egypt, a large percentage of these Christians are unable to read or write. Marginalization, illiteracy, and huge economic difficulties result in chronic poverty and a limited understanding of God's Word. CAM supports numerous remedial classes operated by Christian workers in Egypt. The classes teach reading, writing, and math. The children learn Bible verses and principles while experiencing Jesus' love in practical ways. Without the remedial classes, most of these Egyptian children would not learn to read, write, or understand God's Word.

Family-Self-Support Through this program, thousands of families have been able to start or expand small businesses that provide a regular income. This is a dream come true for families in Romania, Moldova, Ukraine, Liberia, Nicaragua, and the Middle East, where jobs are scarce and opportunities limited. Recipients have used their Family-Self-Support funds to build greenhouses, purchase livestock or tractors, expand construction businesses, start taxi services, and much more.

Favorite Stories from the Bible CAM's Bible story books have been translated into more than 80 languages, making it possible to reach many people groups. Some of these groups have never heard the Gospel. The vivid pictures in the story books help the Bible stories become alive and create a hunger for God's Word in both children and adults.

Food for War-Torn Yemen As the horrific civil war continues in Yemen, millions are at risk of starvation. Many people have died from hunger and disease. This sponsorship provides food to needy people in Yemen. A monthly sponsorship of \$100 provides 190 pounds of food such as flour, rice, beans, sugar, salt, and oil. It also provides cooking gas to prepare nourishing meals.

Food-Parcels-for-Syrian-Refugees Millions of Syrian refugees remain in desperate need of food, heat, and shelter. This program enables CAM to provide food items for displaced people living in Jordan, Lebanon, Iraq, Syria, and Turkey.

Gifts-That-Grow Each year, millions of dollars' worth of free medicines, food, nutritional supplements, and other valuable items are available to CAM. Though companies and individuals donate the items, we must pay procurement fees and shipping costs to bring the products to our warehouse in Pennsylvania. Each dollar donated to the Gifts-That-Grow program helps us procure \$150 worth of donated products. Some funds may also be used to ship the products overseas.

Grow-A-Tree Many trees in Haiti have been chopped down for a quick cash crop, leaving the land barren and prone to soil erosion. Haiti needs trees to help stabilize the soil, reforest the land, and

provide food. CAM starts many kinds of trees in a small nursery at La Source, Haiti. Once ready to transplant, the trees are passed on to families with teaching on how to care for them. A fence is provided to further protect the trees from roaming animals once people show diligence in caring for the trees. Little by little, these trees help reforest northwest Haiti.

Haiti-Sponsor-A-Child Paying for school tuition, uniforms, and textbooks is out of the question for many Haitian parents. About 40 percent of the population is unable to read and write. The Haiti-Sponsor-A-Child school program helps educate children so they can read the Word of God and support themselves as adults. Sponsors' donations supply textbooks, school supplies, and a warm meal each school day for 7,000 students at 40 schools in Haiti. The program also provides Biblical training and subsidized pay for the teachers. A donation of \$65 per month enables five students to go to school.

Help-for-the-Elderly Many elderly people in Romania, Liberia, Haiti, and other impoverished countries have no one to care for them. Some beg on the streets or try to sell a little something for income. Thanks to Help-for-the-Elderly supporters, 20,455 food parcels were provided to needy elderly people in 2021. A \$59 donation provides a 25-pound or larger parcel and \$10 cash or its equivalent in food items. In many cases, a Christian family magazine is also included.

House for a Poor Family For many people in Liberia and Haiti, waking up to rain-soaked clothes and bedding isn't uncommon during rainy season. Many families in cold-climate countries face winter without sufficient shelter, exposing them to low temperatures and bitter winds. Sometimes our staff members encounter situations like a handicapped person living alone in deplorable situations or an elderly woman calling a collapsing house "home." This program helps provide these people with a more stable, secure house. Funds may be used toward purchasing, building, or repairing a house.

Hope-for-the-Handicapped In some cultures, disabled children and adults are neglected and pushed aside. Some suffer in deplorable conditions without anyone to love and care for them. Hope-for-the-Handicapped supplies food, health kits, and other aid to disabled individuals, mental institutions, and homes for the elderly and handicapped. The program operates in Liberia, Kenya, Israel, the Palestinian territories, and other places.

Wheelchairs: Many handicapped people in impoverished countries have little choice but to crawl on their hands and knees. Some of them wear flip flops or other things on their hands for a bit of protection. While wheelchairs may seem like a small gift, they are often life-changing for a handicapped child or adult. They now have a way to get out and interact with the people around them. Supporters' funds enable us to purchase wheelchairs in large quantities for those in need.

International Crisis This program helps victims of famine, war, and other disasters in various countries. Supporters' donations provide emergency food, medicine, clothing, shelter, or other important aid. CAM's main priority in all International Crisis projects is to share the love of Christ in countries with deep spiritual and economic needs. Some of the many areas where CAM had International Crisis projects during 2021 included Afghanistan, Yemen, Bangladesh, Lebanon, Haiti, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Indonesia, and Venezuela.

International-Sponsor-A-Student This program was started to support Christian schools in places lacking quality Christian education. In Liberia, 382 students attend the Light Mennonite and Hope Mennonite schools, which are extensions of the CAM-supported church plants in Monrovia, Liberia. This program also supports a small church school in Romania and provides quality schooling for needy children in Belize. As opportunities arise, this program helps provide Christian schooling in other impoverished areas of the world.

Jericho Road Program This program ministers largely in Gypsy communities of Suceava, Romania. It supports five remedial schools for street children and others who struggle in the public school system. Staff members also hold marriage seminars and home Bible studies, oversee agricultural projects, distribute food to the elderly, and provide other assistance for those in need.

Medicines-for-Multitudes More than 380 medical outlets receive donated medicines through the Medicines-for-Multitudes program. These items are a tremendous blessing to the sick and suffering in parts of the world where access to medical supplies and medicine is limited. Because pharmaceutical companies donate the medicines to CAM, we can ship and distribute \$30 worth of product for every dollar given to this program. In 2021, we shipped an estimated wholesale value of \$43.2 million of medicines, vitamins, nutritional supplements, and medical supplies. Some funds are also used to purchase much-needed medicines we do not receive as donations.

Clinic at La Source, Haiti: Little medical care is available in the La Source, Haiti, area. CAM opened the Joshua Memorial Clinic in 1996 to provide greatly needed medicines and medical care in this remote area of Haiti. In 2021, the staff at the clinic helped 4,973 patients.

Clinic at Waslala, Nicaragua: CAM's Balm of Gilead Clinic in Waslala, Nicaragua, opened in February 1997. The clinic is an important part of the outreach work the conservative Mennonite churches from Costa Rica have done in this area. Free medicines are a great blessing to the suffering people who come to the clinic for help. In 2021, the clinic staff saw 1,749 patients.

Middle East Ministries CAM's goal for ministering in the Middle East is to share Christ's love with the people who inhabit the region where the stories of the Bible took place. Our staff members

who live in this region provide food parcels, wheelchairs, income resources, and other relief to impoverished people. They are also involved in savings group development, English teaching, and other relationship-building ministries.

Milk-for-Many-Mouths This program provides free, fresh milk to needy orphanages, hospitals, and families in Romania. Many Romanian families cannot afford to buy milk or keep a family cow. In 2021, this program distributed approximately 29,350 gallons of milk. More than 1,000 people benefit from this nutritious supplement to their diet each week.

Nicaragua-Adopt-A-Family Nicaragua is the second poorest country in the western hemisphere. Eighty percent of its population lives on only two to three dollars a day. Sponsors help 750 Christian families each month by providing them with 45-pound parcels of food, medicines, and healthcare items. The families also receive the *Antorcha de la Verdad* (Torch of Truth) magazine for spiritual nourishment.

Potatoes for the Poor Potatoes are a staple for people in Central Asia and Eastern Europe. In some former Soviet countries, people sometimes refer to the potato as their “second bread” because they incorporate it into various parts of their daily diet. Rich in nutrients, potatoes rank as one of the world’s most important crops. CAM is providing potatoes to impoverished families and individuals in Central Asia and Eastern Europe where economies are declining, job opportunities are limited, and inflation and food prices are rising. People are grateful to receive potatoes to help them through the long, cold months of winter.

Project Baby Moses Expectant Israeli mothers often face tremendous pressure—physically, spiritually, and financially. Abortion rates in Israel are high, and in many cases the government even funds abortion. Through Project Baby Moses, CAM supports several crisis pregnancy centers in Israel that offer hope, counsel, and assistance to needy mothers. The baby items, spiritual guidance, and emotional support encourage women to carry their babies to full-term. We are exploring options of starting this program in other countries.

Project Good Samaritan This fund meets pressing needs that arise from medical emergencies, house fires, or other unexpected crises. Poverty-stricken people often cannot save for such emergencies and are destitute when they occur. Project Good Samaritan is used primarily in countries where CAM has ongoing projects or field staff, but some funds may be used to meet similar needs in other locations.

Refugee Discipleship Program The influx of thousands of refugees into Greece provides an opportunity to share the Gospel with people who may not hear it otherwise. Most of these refugees are from closed countries where the government restricts the spread of Christianity. We desire to disciple refugees in Greece before they move to other parts of Europe or are forced to return to their home countries. Our staff hold Bible studies and operate an agriculture project to train refugees to start their own agriculture businesses.

SALT Microfinance Solutions SALT is an acronym for Shared Accountability, Lending, and Teaching. This program has two main objectives—to help people discover ways to provide for

their families and to pattern and teach a Biblical way of life. At frequent SALT meetings, clients are taught basic business principles such as how to market goods, keep good records, and work with customers. Most importantly, they hear the Gospel and learn about following Jesus in everyday life. SALT Microfinance Solutions reaches out in the following ways:

Savings Groups: SALT savings groups help the impoverished become the solution to their own financial problems. These groups provide structure to help members work together to save money. As savings accumulate, members can take out small loans to start or expand businesses or help provide for their needs during hard times.

Microloans: Many people in developing countries want to operate a small business and provide for themselves but lack start-up capital. The microloan program uses funding from donors in the United States and issues small loans to help these individuals start or expand small businesses.

Agri-Plus: Farming in developing countries is difficult. Many farmers struggle to feed their families even though they work hard on their small plots of land. They may have the resources available to succeed, but they often lack opportunity and teaching to rise above poverty. Agri-Plus provides teaching on soil conservation, crop production, animal husbandry, and more. Our goal is for farmers to discover simple yet sustainable practices to improve their yields.

Vocational Schools: We continue to develop and operate vocational classes to help the poor in under-developed countries.

Students learn useful, practical skills such as sewing, welding, and auto mechanics. Utilizing these skills helps them work their way out of poverty, contribute to the needs of their communities, and employ others.

Salt & Light: Many of our neighbors in the United States are afflicted with deep debt, broken homes, drug and alcohol addictions, poor financial choices, and more. Salt & Light provides Bible-based financial teaching that Anabaptist churches can use to build relationships with their neighbors and walk alongside them in their financial and spiritual difficulties.

Save-A-Life Every day thousands of children and adults in impoverished countries die from malnutrition and treatable sickness. The Save-A-Life program has rescued many from joining these statistics. In most cases, sickness and malnutrition can be treated with nutritional items and proper medicines. The Save-A-Life program provides these life-saving items in Liberia, Nicaragua, Haiti, and other countries. Sometimes help arrives too late and disease and malnutrition have already claimed a life. But for hundreds of others, the nutrients and medicines give a chance to survive.

Search & Rescue Each day many people go missing and create search and rescue incidents across the U.S. Our nine trained Search & Rescue teams are ready to respond quickly to help local authorities search for lost and missing persons. The goal for this program is to show God’s love and provide support to those in distress.

Seed Project This project provides quality vegetable seeds and supplies for families in Romania, Moldova, Ukraine, and other

countries who depend largely on their gardens for food. In countries like Liberia, Nicaragua, Haiti, and Kenya, CAM provides crop seeds and some agricultural tools and supplies for needy farmers. Our goal for the Seed Project is not only to provide physical seeds but also to plant spiritual seeds through Christian literature and teaching given with the seeds.

Sewing Centers Many women have learned to sew at CAM-supplied sewing centers and are thankful for the opportunity to provide for the practical needs of their families. Some of the items they make are distributed to other needy people. CAM stocks sewing centers in Romania, Ukraine, and Nicaragua with fabric, sewing machines, and notions provided by donors.

Sponsor-A-Refugee-Child Violence in Syria has forced many refugees to flee to surrounding countries. As parents struggle to provide food, shelter, and clothing, almost three out of five Syrian refugee children are not enrolled in school. The Sponsor-A-Refugee-Child program gives school-age refugees in Lebanon access to Christian education that could affect their entire lives. A donation of \$50 per month helps one student go to school.

Sponsor-an-Orphan More than 4,000 orphaned, destitute, and abandoned children in Liberia, Kenya, Nepal, India, and Haiti benefit from this program. For \$59 per month, sponsors provide them with food, clothing, medicines, Christian literature, and some schooling. These children live in orphanages or with Christian families or relatives. Besides providing physically for the children, our goal is to put them in settings where they can learn about Jesus and grow up to help spread the Gospel in their country.

Support-an-Orphan Strong Tower Children’s Home in El Salvador provides a place of refuge, love, and security for abandoned or orphaned children. CAM provides the finances to operate the home, but it is administered by a board and executive committee from the conservative Mennonite churches in El Salvador.

Support-A-Widow Needy widows, widowers, and abandoned wives are some of the most vulnerable people in economically depressed areas. A donation of \$59 provides them with a 35-pound parcel of food, a Christian family magazine, healthcare items, and \$10 cash or its equivalent in other needed items. In 2021, supporters provided 21,888 parcels for recipients in Liberia, Haiti, Nicaragua, Romania, Moldova, Ukraine, India, the Middle East, and other places.

Warm-A-Family Many people in Romania, Moldova, Ukraine, and other cold-climate countries struggle to pay their heating bills or buy fuel to heat their houses during the cold winter months. The Warm-A-Family program helps by supplying firewood, coal, stoves and/or funds to pay heating bills. This assistance goes to families, widows, and elderly people who lack funds to heat their homes.

Water-for-the-World The average household in many parts of the world does not have access to water flowing freely from a spigot. Many people resort to using river water or stagnant pond water, which can result in life-threatening diseases. CAM supplies funds to provide wells, water tanks, water filters, and irrigation systems for people in Kenya, Haiti, Liberia, India, Cambodia, Gaza, and other parts of the world.

Water Systems for Yemen Polluted water sources in Yemen have caused huge cholera outbreaks. The deadly disease threatens many lives. Even if people know where to access clean water, many of them lack the money needed to transport it to their homes. To help provide clean water, CAM offers a water system that collects, stores, and filters rainwater. The need for these systems seems endless. A one-time sponsorship of \$500 provides a rainwater system and makes a big difference for one family.

Widows Care Fund To millions of women, widowhood is a lifelong sentence of disgrace and struggle. Labeled and abandoned, they face a lonely life of suffering. Over the years, our faithful supporters have enabled us to provide food parcels to needy widows around the world. But in seeing other needs, we launched this program to provide food, shelter, self-help resources like sewing machines and animals, or other aid. In some cases, we also help widowers and abandoned wives.

World Hunger Fund Rampant inflation, COVID-19 economic fallout, conflict, and other factors have dramatically increased the world hunger problem in recent years. In 2021, the United Nations reported that more than 155 million people across the globe face severe food insecurity, a significant increase from the previous year. Millions face each day wondering how they will feed themselves and their children. The World Hunger Fund enables CAM to respond to food-related requests from around the world. Funds help provide food and food-producing resources for desperately poor families in India, suffering people in war-torn Yemen, struggling families in former Soviet countries, and others without sufficient food.

Worldwide Refugee Crisis The last decade brought a dramatic increase of displaced people around the world. The number of people who fled their homes due to conflict, famine, and persecution nearly doubled from 40 million to more than 80 million. Refugees in the Middle East, Bangladesh, and other places seek safety for themselves and their families. Innocent people—parents, children, and the elderly—have fled their homes with few belongings. Many refugees depend entirely on the mercy of others. Supporters’ funds provide help like food, emergency aid, and Christian literature to refugees and other people impacted by conflict and other causes of displacement.

An independent auditor is hired by our Board of Directors. Our independent audit was done by the accounting firm Payne, White & Schmutz, CPA, PA. The audit is done according to Auditing Standards generally accepted in the United States of America.

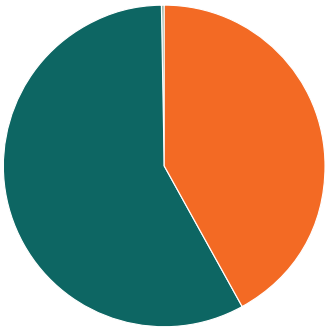
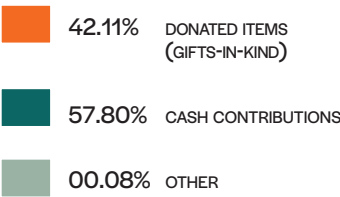

Allocation of expenses

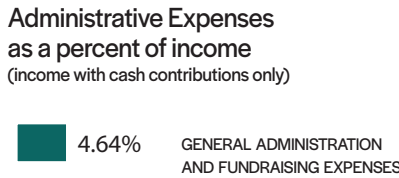
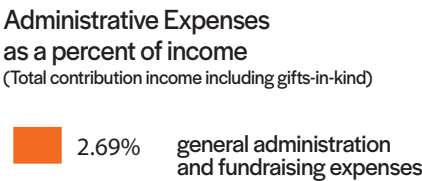
- a. Costs allocated to programs include all related costs, such as product, preparation, shipping, distribution, and program administration costs.*

Independent Auditor’s Report

Opinion

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of Christian Aid Ministries, which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2021, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Christian Aid Ministries as of December 31, 2021, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Christian Aid Ministries and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Christian Aid Ministries’ ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the consolidated financial statements are issued or when applicable, one year after the date that the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor’s report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they

would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the consolidated financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. - Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Christian Aid Ministries’ ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control–related matters that we identified during the audit.

Comparative Information Restated

As discussed in Note 16 to the consolidated financial statements, the 2020 consolidated financial statements have been restated to correct a misstatement. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Report on Summarized Comparative Information

We have previously audited Christian Aid Ministries’ December 31, 2020, consolidated financial statements and we expressed an unmodified audit opinion on those audited consolidated financial statements in our report dated March 25, 2021. In our opinion, the summarized restated comparative information presented herein as of and for the year ended December 31, 2020, is consistent in all material respects other than the restatement discussed in Note 16 in the notes to consolidated financial statements, with the audited consolidated financial statements from which it has been derived. See Note 16 in the notes to consolidated financial statements for additional information.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

General

Christian Aid Ministries (CAM) is incorporated as a nonprofit organization under the laws of Ohio. Its purpose is to provide a reliable and efficient channel through which the church can minister to physical and spiritual needs around the world.

Basis of Accounting and Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) pertaining to Financial Statements of Nonprofit Organizations. Under Financial Statements of Nonprofit Organizations, CAM is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets consisting of net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of CAM and its wholly owned for-profit subsidiary. TGS International, Inc. (TGS) is a United States based company that sells inspirational books and various food items, and provides freight-forwarding services. Intercompany transactions and account balances have been eliminated.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash held in checking and savings accounts and include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase. It is CAM's policy not to treat cash deposits and money market funds held in its investment accounts as cash and cash equivalents.

Promises to Give

Unconditional promises to give donated goods (gifts-in-kind) that are expected to be received within one year are reported at fair value and according to CAM's valuation policy for medicines. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, CAM recognized promises to give amounting to \$10,344,500 and \$2,725,856.

Inventory

Inventories consist of food, medicines, other supplies, and Christian literature. Inventory is stated at the lower of cost or net realizable value for items purchased and at the lower of fair value as of the date of donation or net realizable value for items donated. Gifts-in-kind inventory totaled \$17,022,532 at the end of 2021 and \$14,632,841 at the end of 2020. CAM's gifts-in-kind inventory was distributed as follows in 2021 and 2020: \$7,056,452 (2021) and \$2,604,941 (2020) were located at U.S. warehouses; \$4,775,342 (2021) and \$5,638,237 (2020) were in-transit to foreign sites; and \$5,190,738 (2021) and \$6,389,663 (2020) were located at CAM's foreign operational sites.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all debt securities are reported at fair value. All equity investments relate to planned giving programs and gifts of securities from the time of receipt until sold. It is CAM's policy to promptly liquidate donated securities. Investment income or loss (including gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in the change in net assets.

Realized gains or losses on investments are determined by comparison of specific cost of acquisition to proceeds at the time of sale. Unrealized gains or losses are calculated by comparing cost to market values at the consolidated statement of financial position date.

Other Assets

Other assets include items such as accounts and interest receivable, prepaid expenses, microfinance program loans, and other miscellaneous assets.

Notes Receivable

Notes receivable are carried at the unpaid principal balance. CAM's notes range from interest free to 3.25% interest and are made to an affiliated organization or to foreign staff or nationals who are connected with CAM's program activities. Management periodically evaluates the collectability of its outstanding notes. When management concludes that a note's repayment is unlikely, the note is charged off. Notes receivable are immaterial to CAM's financial statements.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are carried at cost for items purchased and at fair value at the time of donation for donated items. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Maintenance and repairs are charged to operations when incurred. Renewals and betterments of a nature considered to materially extend the useful lives of the assets are capitalized. When assets are retired or otherwise disposed of, the assets and related allowances for depreciation and amortization are eliminated from the accounts and any resulting gain or loss is reflected in income. Depreciation is based on the following policies:

Equipment is capitalized when its cost or donated value equals or exceeds \$5,000 per unit item. Titled vehicles are capitalized regardless of cost.

Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is defined under GAAP as an exit price, representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. CAM uses market information or assumptions that participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. GAAP establishes a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include: Level 1, defined as observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets; Level 2, defined as inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable; and Level 3, defined as unobservable inputs about which little or no market information exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Planned Giving Program

CAM has established a charitable gift annuity plan whereby donors may contribute assets in exchange for the right to receive a fixed dollar annual return during their lifetimes. A portion of the transfer is considered to be a charitable contribution for income tax purposes. The difference between the amount provided for the gift annuity and the liability for future payments, determined on an actuarial basis, is recognized as a contribution without donor restriction at the date of the gift unless the gift portion is restricted. Upon the death of the annuitant (or last joint annuitant) income distributions cease.

As trustee, CAM administers irrevocable trusts, such as charitable remainder unitrusts and charitable remainder annuity trusts. These trusts provide for payment of distributions to the grantor or other designated beneficiaries. When the income beneficiaries' interests are terminated (upon their death or at the end of a term of years), the trusts provide for the distribution of assets to designated charitable organizations or remaindermen. The portion of the trusts attributable to the legally vested remainder interest of CAM is recorded in the consolidated statement of activities as contributions with donor restrictions in the year received. Some trusts may contain provisions allowing the donors to designate remaindermen other than CAM as beneficiaries. Trust liabilities include the present value of the income interest payable to the trust income beneficiaries and any remainder interest not legally vested in CAM.

CAM records planned gift assets at their fair value. Liabilities are recorded at the present value of projected payments, using a 6% or other applicable discount rate, mortality tables, and other actuarial assumptions. Annuity and trust liabilities are revalued annually. Changes in value of annuities and trusts are recorded in the consolidated statement of activities.

Net Assets

The consolidated financial statements report amounts separately by class of net assets:

a)Net assets without donor restrictions are those available at the discretion of the board for use in CAM’s ministries and other functions, and those resources invested in land, buildings and equipment.

b)Net assets with donor restrictions are those restricted by donors for specific operating purposes or for use in a future reporting period. Also included in this category are net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions to be held in perpetuity such as endowments or irrevocable trusts.

Revenue and Support with or without Donor Restrictions

Contributions are recorded with or without donor restrictions depending on the expressed intentions of the donors. Support or revenue is recognized as it is received or as it is earned.

Future Interest in Real Estate

The future interest in real estate is recorded at fair value on the date of contribution. The donor and donor’s spouse are responsible for utilities, property taxes, liability insurance, and maintenance costs to keep the property in good condition. CAM is responsible for property insurance.

Donated Items (Gifts-in-Kind)

Support arising from donated items has been recognized in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The value of the donated items is based on fair value at the time the items are received. Gifts-in-kind medicines are valued at the Red Book wholesale acquisition cost (WAC) if listed, or 70% of the Red Book average wholesale price (AWP) if WAC is not available, or 70% of reliable online retail pricing if neither WAC nor AWP are available.

Contributed Services

A substantial number of volunteers have provided various skilled services that enable CAM to carry out its program activities and support functions. Services are determined based on hours of service donated at the average fair value of comparable services and are reported both as revenue and expense in the period performed. If contributed services are part of a capital project, the value of those services is capitalized. The value of contributed services recorded by CAM totaled \$547,408 in 2021 and \$475,932 in 2020. \$19,126 (2021) and \$50,398 (2020) were attributed to capital projects.

Functional Classification of Expenses

CAM conducts numerous types of program activities that minister to the physical and spiritual needs of people throughout the world. Natural expenses attributable to more than one functional expense category are allocated based upon estimated time and effort of CAM’s employees. Administrative expenses are supporting activities that are not directly identifiable with program activities. Fund raising expenses promote the solicitation of support from current and potential donors for its program and administrative activities. Administrative and fund raising expenses are funded from net assets without donor restrictions. When a program’s expenses exceed specific donor funding, the deficit is drawn from net assets without donor restrictions.

Income Taxes

CAM is tax-exempt under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. TGS is not tax exempt. Current income tax expense for TGS totaled \$17,356 and \$4,357 for 2021 and 2020, respectively.

CAM has adopted accounting principles related to accounting for uncertainty in income taxes. CAM’s policy is to record a liability for any tax position taken that is beneficial to CAM, including any related interest and penalties, when it is more likely than not the position taken by management with respect to a transaction or class of transactions will be overturned by a taxing authority upon examination. Penalties and interest related to underpayment of income taxes are not recorded as income taxes but as penalties and interest expense. Management has determined that it does not have any material unrecognized tax benefits or obligations as of December 31, 2021 and 2020. Years ending on or after December 31, 2018, remain subject to examination by federal and state authorities.

Comparative Data

The consolidated financial statements include certain summarized prior year comparative information in total but not by net asset classification. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with GAAP. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with CAM’s financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2020, from which the summarized information is derived.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2020 amounts to conform to the 2021 financial statement presentation.

Foreign Currency Translation and Transactions

The functional currency of CAM is the U.S. dollar. The financial statements and transactions of CAM’s foreign operations are generally maintained in the relevant local currency. Where local currencies are used, assets and liabilities are remeasured at the consolidated statement of financial position date at the exchange rate in effect at year-end. Income transactions that occur in foreign currencies are translated using the exchange rate on the date of the transaction. Expense transactions that occur in foreign currencies are translated using the

exchange rate on the date that USD funds are exchanged to foreign denominations in order to pay expenses. This exchange rate is deemed to approximate the exchange rate on the date of the transactions. Gains and losses from foreign currency translation are included in the current year change in net assets.

Subsequent Events Evaluation

Management has evaluated subsequent events through March 30, 2022, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 – Financial Assets and Liquidity Resources:

CAM’s operations are primarily funded by contributions with and without donor restrictions. Those restrictions require that resources be used for specific program activities or in a future period. Therefore, CAM must maintain adequate resources to meet those responsibilities to its donors and certain financial assets may not be available for general expenditure within one year. As part of its liquidity management, CAM has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations become due. CAM tries to maintain cash on hand at a minimum of ten weeks of its annual budget. It endeavors to keep about \$5,000,000 in its main operating checking account. Excess funds are invested in FDIC insured money market accounts and certificates of deposit with varying maturity dates. Also, the governing board would consider authorizing operational loans should it be deemed necessary to do so.

CAM has established a cash management program with a local bank. Deposits are transferred to and from a sweep account daily. The sweep account is funded with repurchase agreements. The repurchase agreements are backed by government securities and are held by another financial institution. The bank reserves the right to substitute the collateral prior to the repurchase date upon notice to CAM. Deposits in its sweep accounts totaled \$5,310,000 in 2021 and \$2,890,000 in 2020. Deposits not covered by depository insurance totaled \$744,099 at the end of 2021 and \$748,725 at the end of 2020. Management believes that any credit risk related to these deposits is minimal.

The following schedule reflects CAM’s financial assets as of 2021 and 2020, reduced by amounts that are not available for general use due to contractual or donor-imposed restrictions within one year of the statement of financial position date. Amounts that are not available also include board designated amounts that could be utilized if the board of directors approved their use.

Note 6 – Fair Value Measurements:

The carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents and accounts receivable approximates fair value because of the short-term maturities of those instruments. The fair values of investments are based on market prices obtained from various financial institutions. The carrying amount of accounts payable and accrued expenses approximates fair value because of the short-term maturities of those instruments.

Prices for investments such as stocks which are readily available in the active markets in which those securities are traded, and open-ended mutual funds that produce a daily net asset value that is validated with a sufficient level of observable activity, are categorized as Level 1. The net asset value of open-ended mutual funds represents the exit value of the security at the measurement date. As money market mutual funds are normally priced at the amortized cost of the securities held in the fund, and not at market value, these securities are categorized as Level 2. Certificates of deposit which are publicly traded are categorized as Level 2, as these are valued based on other observable inputs rather than quoted prices on an active market. Level 3 items are based on assumptions developed by management.

There were no changes during 2021 and 2020 to CAM’s valuation techniques to measure asset and liability fair values on a recurring basis. The following tables sets forth by level within the fair value hierarchy CAM’s assets accounted for at fair value on a recurring basis as of December 31, 2021 and 2020. Assets are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. CAM’s assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment, and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

Note 10 - Related Party Transactions:

In November 2005, Christian Aid Ministries entered into a joint ministries agreement with Christian Aid Ministries of Waterloo (CAMW), a Canadian nonprofit organization. The agreement sets forth terms by which both organizations can pool their resources to accomplish specified program objectives. These programs are conducted through the operations of CAM. The Canadian organization also operates a clothing center, with the shipments going to CAM’s overseas operations. CAM received contributions of \$4,304,978 in 2021 and \$1,958,625 in 2020 from CAMW.

Christian Aid Ministries and Christian Aid Ministries Foundation (CAMF) are related organizations. Both organizations have the same governing board of directors. CAMF contributed \$2,053,649 in 2021 and \$900,817 in 2020 to CAM. As of the current year-end, CAMF was holding \$3,000,000 of CAM’s funds for investment in certificates of deposit. This amount is included in CAM’s investment in certificates of deposit, since CAMF has no variance power to utilize the funds for any other purpose.

Note 11 - Employee Benefit Plan:

CAM provides a Section 403(b) Plan. Each employee is eligible to participate on the first date of employment. CAM does not provide matching contributions.

Note 12 – Donor Concentrations:

CAM received \$29,210,059 of donated items from one donor in 2021 and \$25,645,683 from the same donor in 2020. These donations accounted for 17.93% and 19.35%, respectively, of CAM’s total revenue for each year.

Note 13 – Revenue from Contracts with Customers:

Revenue from contracts with customers should be recognized when the entity fulfills its performance obligations to its customers. The sources of revenue from contracts with customers are as follows:

Books and food items – Performance obligations are completed at the point of sale for walk-in customers or at the time of shipment for items ordered. Payment is due at the point of sale or at the time of shipment. There are no formal, written contracts associated with the sale of these items. Contract assets include accounts receivable and there is not a return policy since returns would be infrequent and only for trivial amounts. Contract liabilities include deferred revenue when payments are received prior to the order being completed.

Freight-forwarding services – Management has determined that it only has one performance obligation related to its freight-forwarding services which is deemed completed when containers or items are ready for shipment. Customers are billed for incurred costs plus an administrative markup of up to 20%. Payment is due when containers or items are ready for shipping. Contract assets include accounts receivable and there are no contract liabilities associated with this revenue source.

Employee leasing – A small number of employees are leased to a related entity to work at a specific project. Payrolls are run on a bi-weekly basis and leasing income is earned during the course of each payroll period. There are no formal written contracts for its leased employees. Earned revenue is based on cost plus and administrative markup. Billing for these services occurs monthly and payment is due at billing. Contract assets include accounts receivable and contract liabilities include wages payable related to the leased employees.

Note 14 – Billboard Leases:

CAM leases billboard space in its Billboard Evangelism program. Lease terms are generally less than twelve months in length. Monthly lease payments ranged from \$230 to \$62,100 in 2021 and ranged from \$166 to \$73,347 in 2020. These leases entitle CAM to place a gospel message at a single location or at multiple locations. At December 31, CAM had about 180 (2021) and 884 (2020) billboard leases. Lease payments approximated \$5,046,625 in 2021 and \$4,095,036 in 2020.

Note 15 – Transfer of Assets to Organization:

As of the beginning of the current reporting period, CAM ceased management of a portion of its operations located in the Suceava area of Romania. The operations were assumed by American staff and national workers under the responsibility of another charitable organization. All of the assets and liabilities associated with the operation were transferred to the entity located in Romania. The following schedule details the assets and liabilities transferred:

Note 16 – Correction of an Accounting Error in the Prior Year:

CAM’s management discovered an error in the valuation of its foreign inventory valuation as of December 31, 2020. The error caused an overstatement in the prior year inventory balance. An entry to restate the prior year ending inventory was made to correct for this overstatement and this adjustment necessitated an adjustment to beginning net assets. Since comparative financial information is included in the financial statements, the prior period line items were restated to reflect this correction.
